Spring Into Action



FOTAS strives to improve the welfare of animals, not just at the County Shelter but throughout Southern Oregon.

In addition to our volunteer cadre working with the dogs in Jackson County, we have many other exciting programs currently underway or planned.

Our top priority is getting the FOTAS Community Spay/Neuter Clinic up and running. We are making great strides and to date have served 432 animals.

We have created a new Cat Committee, to assist the cats in our community and to bring back our former cat volunteers. In addition to our impressive cat and kitten foster program, we hold monthly Feline Fairs in conjunction with other feline rescue organizations. Plans are underway to house a limited number of felines at the clinic as we seek to find permanent homes for them.

We have vibrant cat and dog foster programs that are helping these animals get into their forever homes.

Finally, our monthly low-cost vaccination and microchip clinics provide needed services to the members of our community with hundreds attending these important events.

None of this is possible without your support and we hope you will continue to volunteer, foster, adopt and donate.

Saving Lives Through Our Dog Foster Programs

At FOTAS, our Foster Program is changing the lives of homeless pets every day.

For dogs that struggle in the county shelter environment, fostering provides a bridge to the loving, permanent homes they deserve.

FOTAS pays for our foster animal's needs from food, bedding, and tools to vaccinations, spay/neuter surgeries, medical care and training. We take our foster dogs out to the community and adoption events because we also help them find their forever homes.



Penelope's Journey: From Shy to Shine

When Penelope, a shy Rottweiler mix, arrived at the shelter, the noise overwhelmed her. But in Kelly's calm foster home, she found peace. With love and training, Penelope blossomed – and eventually we found her a forever family. But with her new family, an unexpected hiccup occurred. When they left her at a boarding facility for a trial stay – Penelope panicked and escaped! What followed was a remarkable demonstration of community support. FOTAS volunteers mobilized, spreading the word on social media, posting flyers, and forming search parties. After nearly a week of searching, it was Kelly, her devoted foster mom, who found her. The moment Penelope saw her,

she ran straight into her arms, safe at last!



Sweetpea & Her Surprise Pups

Sweetpea, a nervous Chihuahua, arrived at the county shelter unexpectedly pregnant. Shortly after giving birth to two tiny puppies, she and her puppies were placed with one of our experienced fosters, Barbara. Protective of her babies at first, Sweetpea soon learned to trust Barbara, allowing her to provide the care they needed. Today, her pups Nico and Nala are thriving. All three dogs will be spayed and neutered at the FOTAS clinic, just one example of how our dedicated donors and volunteers make a lasting impact on animals in need.

JJ: The Resilient Three-Legged Wonder

JJ, a high-energy, affectionate two-year-old Blue Heeler, arrived at the Jackson County Shelter with a broken leg and fractured pelvis. The shelter reached out to FOTAS for assistance. Thanks to our donors, staff, volunteers, and an incredibly dedicated foster, JJ received the medical care he needed. Following surgery to remove his injured leg, JJ bounced back faster than anyone expected – many thanks to his foster mom, Lisa.

Foster Cats

What a Little Company Can Do

When Joey was adopted in November, we hoped it was his forever home. But something wasn't quite right. He developed PICA, a behavioral condition where cats chew or eat non-food items. His adoptive family tried everything – vets, home adjustments, behavior changes – but nothing helped.

Then came a turning point.

Joey returned to his FOTAS foster family and reunited with his sisters. The PICA symptoms vanished. That foster family decided to make it official and make it Joey's home for good.

Clinic Now Open



A Game-Changer for Animal Welfare!

The Friends of the Animals Community Spay & Neuter Clinic is officially open! Built with passion and purpose, the clinic operates under ASPCA's best practices to provide accessible, high-quality care.



To ensure that the proper procedures were in place, the Clinic spent February refining systems while launching the new Volume Partner Program. The program provides services to qualifying shelters and non-profit animal rescue groups in an effort to speed up the adoption process for homeless dogs and cats. Within a five-county area, eleven organizations have already expressed interest in becoming Volume Partners. Pricing for these groups has been reduced with FOTAS covering a percentage of the surgery fees. "Helping these non-profits is an important part of our mission," states Board President Becky Cohn. "Reducing the number of animals entering shelters is the reason we started the Clinic."

The Clinic opened appointments to the general public on February 23 via its easy-to-access online appointment portal. Notifications of open appointments were posted on our social media channels. The scheduling link was activated at 8 a.m., and within 20 minutes, 42 appointments had been requested. By the end of the day, 95% of the appointments were filled, and the clinic's social media posts had been shared extensively throughout the animal welfare community.

Currently, the Clinic's surgery schedule is dependent on the veterinarians' availability. The goal, once fully staffed, is to provide surgeries 5-6 days a week, with two veterinarians working each day. We're deeply grateful to our vendors, volunteers, and donors. You've made this possible. We're still seeking support to keep our prices accessible and impact high.

SNYP THANK YOU LETTER FROM SALLY MACKLER

FOTAS is a nonprofit deeply involved in animal health every day. We see where the needs are – and we act.

Thanks to donor support, we were able to fund 10 full days of feral cat spay/neuter surgeries through SNYP (Spay/Neuter Your Pet), a trusted local organization with the facilities and expertise for this feral cat work – something our new Community Clinic isn't yet equipped to handle.

That funding led to 295 feral cats being spayed or neutered in 2025 – helping control the population and reduce suffering across Southern Oregon.


Your donations don't just support us. They allow us to support others – strategically, compassionately, and where it matters most.

Affordable Care For Pets

FOTAS cares about your beloved 4-footed companions! We help you help them stay protected from common diseases that can cause illness and death by providing a safe and inexpensive way to get your pets vaccinated.

We also offer microchips, a permanent form of identification that is injected between the shoulder blades. It is not a tracking device. Comes with a life-time membership; no additional fees.

All at a monthly low-cost as a service to our community. Simply sign up your cats and dogs for vaccinations online – one appointment per pet. Once you sign up, you'll be sent emails and texts to confirm and remind your about your appointments, and where to show up!



To reduce the stress on you and your pets, you'll stay in your car while you wait in line (approximately 1 hour) and then will meet with professionals to get your pets vaccinated.


